Course Description:

The Hopkins Summer Program in Bologna is a collaborative, team-taught program featuring two courses and held at the SAIS Europe campus in historic Bologna, Italy. This first course, "Populism in Comparative Perspective," will focus on right wing populism in the world, providing students with a broad understanding of the historical and theoretical underpinnings of right wing populism as well as contemporary expressions of populism as both a social movement and a political ideology. Cases to be explored in the course include Italy, Germany, France, Norway, Hungary, Turkey, India, Russia, the UK, and the US.

Course Texts:

All required and recommended readings will be posted on Blackboard in the E-reserves folder.

Course Requirements:

Each student will write two reflection papers on the day's readings. These papers should include (1) a brief synthesis of one or more central arguments of the week's reading and (2) two or three questions for in-class discussion. Reflection papers should be uploaded to the blackboard site no later than 8pm (Italy time!) of the day before the relevant class session. Reflection papers should be no more than one page, single-spaced. Students will offer brief presentations of their reflection papers at the beginning of class.

Each student will write a 7-8 page final paper, which discusses a particular case of right wing populism by critically engaging with texts, concepts, theory, or analysis used in lectures.
